
## USC ALUM - ELLIE ROSCHER

# Impact of Service from 2019-2020 Volunteers



New Legacy Charter School – A charter school for pregnant and parenting teens and their children with specially tailored options to support teen parents and his/her children.

Brady taught and coached students who are teen parents.



**Urban Peak Shelter –** An over-night shelter for youth who are experiencing homelessness that offers access to basic needs.

Raquel supported youth experiencing homelessness by sharing resources and trusted care in their most vulnerable moments.

Urban Peak Outreach – A drop-in center that helps homeless and at-risk youth overcome real life challenges by providing essential services and a safe community, empowering them to become self-sufficient adults. *Karina served as an outreach worker, offering resources and support to youth ages 15-24 experiencing homelessness.* 



Senior Support Services – A day center for hungry and homeless seniors where they are offered a safe place to spend time, socialize with others, and participate

in activities.

Brigid assisted clients by providing meals, access to clothes, and offering resources for health care and housing.

The Gathering Place – A day-time drop-in

**Every Child Pediatrics** – A pediatric medical office that provides high-quality health care to all children, regardless of their family's insurance status or ability to pay.

**St. Francis Center –** A day-time shelter that offers a place of transformation for people who are homeless. Hailey welcomed 700+ guests a day to the day-time shelter where individuals could have a shower, receive mail, or store belongings.
